

Continuing Activities

Don't forget we continue to pack lunches on a monthly basis for Light of Life Rescue Mission. We fill brown bags with non-perishable items, such as tuna salad or chicken salad with crackers in a box, raisins, granola bars, small bags of chips, small bags of cookies, powdered drinks or juice boxes, chewing gum, fruit cups, and candy.

In addition, we collect funds for our Bill Dixon Memorial Hope Fund sponsored through Gateway Rehab. Addiction Recovery Ministry helps with funds for people who have completed a program and need assistance with bus passes, first month's rent, clothing, and food.

Never put a period where God put a comma

I came across this phrase a few years ago and I really believe it speaks profoundly to the person in recovery. You notice we always say, "recovery," never "recovered." Recovery is not static. Rather, it is dynamic and fluid. There is no cure for a substance use disorder; that is addiction/alcoholism. There is treatment, but no cure. Addiction is a fatal, progressive disease and if left untreated, will be fatal! That is why we say recovery. That being the case, then there is only a comma on our journey of recovery. Because this journey into honesty, humility, and growth never ends. The longer we are in recovery, the more we learn about ourselves. The more honest we become, the more we see our strengths and weaknesses. The more humble we become, the more we understand, embrace, and celebrate powerlessness. We understand how powerlessness relieves us of the burden to be self. And remember, powerlessness is not the same as helplessness. We are not helpless; we chose recovery. We choose to follow the program. We choose not to take the first drink or drug. And in recovery, we never stop growing. As we continue with the adventure of recovery, the more we see, own, feel our God, and live our truth. So there is no period! No graduation into sobriety, no report card, or measuring our progress. There is only constant growth. The clearer our sight, the more we see. The more we see, the greater our experience of God, who knows us, warts and all, and loves us; loves us extravagantly and unconditionally. We come to see that God's love is a gift. We did not earn it and we cannot lose it. There is never a period or end to recovery. It is a whole way of living. Living in humble, honest gratitude. Knowing and believing with our whole heart that for God, there is no period. There is always a comma, allowing us to continue to grow into the miracle of recovery.
